While philanthropy runs deep for Rajesh Rajaraman and Deepika Rajesh, theirs is a story of connections, community and building solid foundations on which to grow.

Growing up in different parts of India, the pair met through their families in 1985, and built a friendship over many years before becoming engaged in 1993. In 1991, Rajesh moved to Madison for the opportunity to study electrical engineering. Upon his graduation, he accepted a job at Christensen Associates, a local economic and engineering firm. Rajesh and Deepika got married in India shortly after, and in 1995 they officially moved to the Dane County community to start their lives together.

Falling in love with the city of Madison, they quickly knew they had a bright future here. "This community is incredible," says Deepika. "Madison is a great place to raise children and make very meaningful friends."

Rajesh retired from Christensen Associates as a vice president in 2017 and co-founded ARB Energy and ModBESS, where he applies his expertise in energy, economics and engineering. Deepika has built a distinguished career of more than 25 years as a scientist, dedicated to improving the world's health in the areas of immunology, cancer biology and stem cell research.

In addition to building impressive and impactful careers over the past three decades, they had two sons, Amol and Amit (both of whom volunteered as part of United Way's By Youth for Youth program, carrying on the philanthropic nature of their parents). And with Deepika having a long-standing passion for education, she made it a point to volunteer in many different capacities with her children's school system. "I would just volunteer for anything that was in offer at the school," she said. "From sharpening pencils or being the chaperone at the lunchroom. I wanted to be a part of the education system in this community from the very beginning."



As their children grew older, Deepika remained deeply involved. And in their high school years, she began assisting with the Capital Science and Engineering Fair – which has been run as an open opportunity for children across the state to participate in, no matter their circumstance. Each year, the winner of the fair goes on to the national competition, gaining the opportunity to secure academic scholarships.

“What Deepika wanted to do – and very gladly – was make sure that underprivileged and minority kids especially have an opportunity to go, observe, learn and participate,” said Rajesh.

“Children can be sparked with science, with art, with anything! They just need to have that opportunity to explore. And it is important to me that we give them that opportunity,” added Deepika.

Deepika’s other passions lay within the arts, and she is also on the boards of the Madison Opera, Wisconsin Youth Symphony Orchestra and Melharmony Foundation. With these organizations, she has built upon her personal interests by becoming an active volunteer leader who expands opportunities for others.

While Deepika’s contributions to our community are nothing short of inspiring, Rajesh has also given a great deal to make Dane

County a better place for all – particularly through his involvement with us at United Way since 2000, which he credits to his former CEO, Lau Christensen.

“One day, Lau came to my office and encouraged me to become a Tocqueville member,” explained Rajesh. “I trusted him so much that I said, ‘ok, we’ll do it!’ To be honest, we didn’t know much about United Way at the time. I had made contributions as a student, but I never realized the kind of community support United Way provides. That first Tocqueville dinner was quite an eye-opener.”

Very quickly, both Rajesh and Deepika became inspired by the community behind United Way and the impact they make possible. For Rajesh, United Way became a way to learn and give back – and not just with dollars.

Through connections he made at United Way and knowledge he gained from the staff and other volunteers, Rajesh found a passion for helping families and individuals access affordable housing. In 2013, he joined the Basic Needs Community Solutions Team (CST), bringing a fierce commitment and crucial knowledge of finance to the table. Raj seeks innovative and impactful solutions to our community’s most pressing concerns.



The CST was seeing great success in family homelessness reduction using its innovative impact strategies (housing first, case management, food access, eviction prevention), however progress slowed when the community was short on housing inventory. Rajesh challenged us to expand our approach to decrease homelessness by creating more affordable housing units – the focus of our Affordable Housing Fund established in 2018. Its loans are the 'last dollars' to complete financing packages for nonprofit-sponsored developments. Raj is an original committee member, and he and Deepika are also lead donors.

Rajesh is also credited with bringing another innovative idea to United Way – a social investment fund. In partnership with Madison Development Corporation and the Economic Stability Council, staffed by United Way and led by fellow Tocqueville donor Rich Lynch, the Dane Workforce Housing Fund has an aim to contribute 500 new affordable workforce housing units to our community's inventory over the next three years. Fund 1 raised over \$10 million, and fund 2 is in the works now.

“Coming from India, we’ve seen homelessness and poverty at a scale you’d be shocked to see,” said Rajesh. “But once I joined the Basic Needs CST, I started learning more about programs and gaps that existed in this community and I really wanted to contribute. The Basic Needs Committee gave me the vehicle to do that, and I never looked back.”

Since then, Rajesh has proven himself a crucial asset to the efforts of United Way. Always willing to learn, contribute and innovate, Rajesh has held many volunteer and leadership roles with the organization, including sitting on the Board of Directors for six years, participating in the Vision Council, Strategic Collaborations Capacity Building Team and the Affordable Housing Fund Committee





of the United Way Foundation, among others. He is one of United Way's most dedicated advocates, volunteers and donors.

"I learned a lot about United Way through Rajesh," said Deepika. "Whenever he came home from a meeting, I saw the excitement in him. He would tell me and the kids all about these cool facts and about how much of a demand and need there is. It opened our attention to a lot of things and pushed us to give back in every way we could."

In true United Way fashion, Rajesh believes that every neighbor deserves the tools needed to build a successful life – and he's doing his part to inspire and empower others to get involved as well.

"We don't want a community in which only certain people are doing well and the rest are not," he says. "We need to make sure that every one of us lives a good life. That's all we can hope for, right? Ensuring that, at least at the very basic level, people have a quality of life – that they can be comfortable and live a long and productive life."

While the problems we face in Dane County are not unique to our community, Rajesh acknowledges that United Way of Dane County is itself unique and feels confident in our collective ability to make change.

"The problems we face are very difficult," says Rajesh. "They are not going to be solved tomorrow or overnight. United Way does a very good job in bringing the right people to the table to form solutions. It is important to give money and time. We give these things to United Way because we trust that they are doing the right thing with it."

"From the very beginning, we felt good to be a part of this group. It's just spectacular," says Deepika. "We're both interested in philanthropy, and we know this is the best place to invest. The warmth that we feel and the stories of success we hear at each event make us so very proud to be a part of United Way."

On behalf of United Way of Dane County and the United Way Tocqueville Society, the feeling is mutual. We are so proud to have Deepika and Rajesh as a part of the United Way family! Your passion, dedication and contributions are a big part of the change we're building, together. Thank you.

United Way of Dane County Tocqueville Society

Tocqueville Society was created by United Way nationally in 1984 to celebrate the legacy of Alexis de Tocqueville, whose 1835 *Democracy in America* celebrated the impact of North American volunteerism and giving for the sake of the common good. Today, 430 Tocqueville Societies across the network connect like-minded philanthropic leaders from nearly 23,000 households who invest more than \$519 million annually. In Dane County, Tocqueville Society was launched in 1990 by Jerry M. Hiegel and Oscar G. Mayer and today has grown to nearly 250 households among its ranks who have invested over \$68 million in our community to improve lives.

These resources have been invested in effective community strategies, increasing literacy and graduation rates, decreasing family homelessness, increasing pathways to family-sustaining wages and much more.
